A Letter from the DREF Research Matters for *All of Us* Leadership

On behalf of the Delta Research and Educational Foundation's (DREF) Research Matters for *All of Us* Program, we are excited to share the 2024-2025 Annual Report. The report highlights the many activities performed during the year and illustrates the immense impact DREF has had in engaging, enrolling, and registering adults and researchers into the *All of Us* Research Program.

DREF Research Matters is committed to educating communities on the many illnesses and diseases that impact people nationwide and facilitating enrollment in biomedical research through the *All of Us* Research Program. Since becoming a National Community Engagement Partner in 2017, DREF has reached over 2.8 million individuals and engaged over 660,000 adults. This year, the program spanned 7 major cities and 5 colleges and universities around the country, and when approved as a Facilitated Enrollment Partner in January, supported the creation of 375 accounts and the facilitation of 190 consenting participants. DREF also supported the registration of 39 new researchers onto the Researcher Workbench, and trained them on best practices for active use.

During the 2024-2025 year, the Research Matters team developed collaborative partnerships with many community-based and research organizations and leveraged these relationships to create awareness and sustain engagement among adults and researchers. Through these partnerships, DREF engaged over 140,000 participants across 150 events and initiatives. In addition, DREF engaged over 300 researchers, enabling their use of the Researcher Workbench and supported universities in building research capacity by incorporating the use of the *All of Us* dataset into curriculum.

The entire DREF Research Matters for *All of Us* team thanks you for the opportunity to create a paradigm shift and empower communities to participate in biomedical research.



DREF Research Matters

The 2024 - 25 fiscal year marks the eighth year that Delta Research and Educational Foundation (DREF) has been selected by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) for the health initiative, Research Matters: Creating Possibilities to Achieve Health and Wellness for All of Us. The NIH has awarded funding to DREF to focus on community engagement, facilitated enrollment, and research. DREF is leading the national effort to educate communities about the significant role biomedical research plays in addressing health disparities and encourage participation through the All of Us Research Program.

Citywide Coordinator (NIH-Designated Cities) Outreach Events and Enrollment Clinics

All of Us Program Goal: Education and Access

Milestone: Perform community engagement by hosting at least one monthly Citywide Coordinator (CWC) outreach event (at least 70 events) in NIH designated markets to educate communities on predetermined health topics and the *All of Us* Research Program, in collaboration with nonprofit and faith-based organizations.




Recognizing the power of community in shaping the health research landscape, DREF's engage-to-enroll strategies included multiple touchpoints with potential participants that addressed medical mistrust and health concerns that disproportionately impact marginalized communities. These strategies were implemented by hosting **81** Citywide Coordinator events in the 2024 - 2025 grant year with local and national collaborations with nonprofit and faith-based organizations, spread across **7** NIH-designated cities. Citywide Coordinator efforts included in-person and virtual events, and presentations at professional conventions, with medical experts and researchers as guest speakers, that educated and empowered attendees to be fully-informed participant partners in biomedical research through the *All of Us* Research Program.




- Hosted 81 community engagement events in 7 designated cities

All of Us Program Goal: Education and Access

Milestone: Partner with (5) Colleges and Universities during the Fall (2024) and Spring (2025) semesters to administer the Research Accelerates Possibilities (R.A.P) program that will educate students, and faculty, on the health benefits of participating in research and encourage them to enroll in the *All of Us* Research Program.



The Research Accelerates Possibilities (R.A.P.) Sessions program brings together student ambassadors and faculty advisors to educate their campus', and campus communities, about the value of precision medicine, biomedical research, and the *All of Us* Research Program. Through monthly events related to pertinent health concerns, Journey Bus collaborations, and the dedication of our Collegiate Engagement team, R.A.P. engaged over 2,000 participants this year.








Time Well Spent

This year marks the fifth and final year of the Research Accelerates Possibilities (R.A.P.) Program. Since the program's start in 2020, R.A.P. has impacted several Cohorts of Colleges and University communities by & with:



PARTNERSHIPS

Throughout the R.A.P. Program, DREF partnered with **17** Colleges and Universities, **14** of which established DURAs at their institutions for use of the *All of Us* Workbench.

UPLIFTING

Across the program's lifespan, DREF has funded 17 Faculty Advisors and provided opportunities to learn about research and issues that impact the associated campus' communities for 33 Student Ambassadors.

TAILORING

R.A.P. planned and hosted a total of **288** sessions, including **6** partnered events with the *All of Us* MET for Outreach and Enrollment across campuses in the Southeast U.S.

EDUCATING

R.A.P. was able to educate students and faculty on the benefits of participating in health research, and encouraged enrollment in the *All of Us* Research Program for over **16,211** attendees.



Facilitated Enrollment

All of Us Program Goal: Engage to Enroll

Milestone: Increase the number of adults enrolled in the *All of Us* Research Program by facilitating enrollment through the implementation of outreach initiatives to engage and retain participants, working with communities through sites in key areas.

In 2025, DREF was selected to be an engagement partner that transitioned into a facilitated enrollment partner under the Division of Engagement and Outreach (DEO). DREF worked with DEO to receive Institutional Review Board (IRB) approval, confirming the selection of **4** NIH designated cities where Facilitated Enrolment Consultants would partner with the established Citywide Coordinator to engage communities, educate residents, and encourage individuals to enroll in the *All of Us* Research Program.

The **4** selected facilitated enrollment sites included: Chicago, Illinois, Detroit, Michigan, New Orleans, Louisiana and 2 colleges and universities in Jackson, Mississippi, Each site had **2** fully-trained Enrollment Coordinators, with a total of **6** across the program. These operations led to the creation of **375** accounts and **190** consent completions, across national conferences, enrollment workshops, and multiple collaborations with HPOs and the MET.

Impact:

- Facilitated the enrollment of 375 accounts and 190 consents in 4 designated cities*; surpassing proposed account creation by 50% and consent completion by 90%
- Sponsored and attended 5 national conferences reaching 16,700 attendees
- Hosted 16 enrollment workshops across 4 NIH designated cities
- Assisted with the collection of 21 PM&B collections with HPOs on University campuses
- Collaborated with the Mobile Engagement Team (MET) to gather **112** account creations, **85** consent completions, and **33** PM&B collections







Researchers and Medical Providers Outreach and Engagement

All of Us Program Goal: Researcher Access and Impact

Milestone: Host three (3) national events that will inform researchers and medical providers of the information available in the *All of Us* Research Hub and Workbench and mobilize partnerships to execute DURAs. Continue to complete the two (2) previously established research projects and provide data science support to to enable the establishment and completion of other research projects on the *All of Us* Researcher Workbench.




In alignment with the *All of Us* Social-Ecological Model of Researcher Engagement, DREF addresses the varying levels of structural barriers faced by researchers from varying communities. By working to break down these barriers, DREF not only increased the number of researchers and institutions that have access to the *All of Us* Research Hub, but also increased trust and visibility with potential participants. This synergistic impact serves as a force-multiplier for efforts to accelerate the healthcare breakthroughs that may come from *All of Us*.

The DREF 22 Research Working Group, who are members of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. and have research portfolios aimed at improving the health and wellness of diverse communities, work collaboratively to facilitate education, outreach, and engagement within their professional networks, making colleagues aware of the *All of Us* Research Program and Researcher Workbench. Collectively, the group was successful in establishing Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) with **4** organizations: Black Nurses Association, Black Women in Clinical Research, Black Researchers Collective, Black Forum. In addition, the cohort executed **2** Lunch and Learn sessions, **4** Usability sessions, and the **National Research Symposium**. These events were attended by researchers and medical providers and focused on health topics facing specific communities.

Impact:

- Neared completion on **2** research projects using the Workbench dataset; Project publications planned for the 2025-2026 year
- Hosted the **National Research Symposium** that featured a health topic that engages diverse researchers and illustrates research projects based on the Workbench dataset
- Hosted 2 Lunch and Learn Webinars that shared research on health disparity topics and provided overviews of Workbench research projects (108 participants)
- Hosted and supported 4 usability sessions in partnership with Seven Star Academy, engaging 15 collaborating researchers, sharing information on the Workbench, and supporting researcher registrations and data science assistance

College & University Researcher Engagement & Institutional Liaisons

All of Us Program Goal: Researcher Access and Impact

Milestone: Develop and award five (5) small grants to students at eight (8) colleges and institutions to support research projects and award faculty buyout funds to enable the dedication of time for DURA execution, researcher training and Workbench registrations. Host two (2) HBCU researcher technical workshops for faculty and student researchers at institutions with DURAs & host two (2) grant-writing sessions to provide diverse researchers training in grant writing and identifying funding sources, as well as the specific technical skills and tools needed to work with the *All of Us* data set.

DREF's College and University Researcher Engagement initiatives underscored the importance of expanding access to the *All of Us* Researcher Workbench to various researchers. DREF leveraged strategic partnerships with several colleges and universities participating in the RAP Program to build the institution's research capacity by having institutional liaisons leverage the *All of Us* Research Program. Joining our partner institutions this year were Tuskegee University and Southern University and A&M College. The two new College and University Institutional Liaisons were:

Accomplishments:

- Registered 24 new researchers who completed the required training to use the All of Us Researchers Workbench
- Facilitated **3** in-person trainings for **24** registered *All of Us* Researchers Workbench users, in collaboration with Seven Star Academy, Inc.
- Initiated a partnership with the United Negro College Fund to facilitate a tailored webinar for
 42 participants
- Over 50 people attended informational sessions about the All of Us Researchers Workbench, how to register, and how DREF support researchers that use the Researchers Workbench in coursework and research
- Faculty members incorporated the All of Us Researchers Workbench into coursework for 5
 professors
- Faculty members among institutions worked with **6** students to mentor their research projects that used data from the *All of Us* Researchers Workbench.
- **3** faculty (with and without students) submitted research abstracts for national research conferences
- Grant writing funds were used to support student research projects, presentations, and to supplement *All of Us* training initiatives.

Social Media Engagement

DREF has grown a substantial presence on social media through established channels that are heavily utilized by researchers, potential enrollees, and current participants (i.e. Instagram, X, LinkedIn, Facebook), using content that directly addresses the importance of diversifying research. This effort has garnered shares of our content across social media channels, using existing research organizations and community-based organizations that are uniquely poised to address societal issues faced by researchers. Impact was measured through metrics, tracking the numbers of impressions, shares, likes, comments, and saves of posts.

The DREF Research Matters for *All of Us* program highlights the importance of research related to several illnesses and diseases affecting various communities. DREF Research Matters events and social media accounts have included, among others, the following monthly themes:

- Men's Health
- World AIDS Day
- Maternal Health
- Mental Health Awareness
- Breast Cancer Awareness
- Heart Disease Prevention



Sub-Awardees & Initiatives



In October of 2024, DREF was asked to incorporate Mocha Moms Inc. as a sub-awardee for the remainder of the fiscal year. The partnership between the two organizations fostered an unique opportunity to combine pediatric enrollment efforts and community engagement, using DREF's pre-established CWC network and Mocha Mom's nationwide ambassadors.

Under this fiscal year's award, Mocha Moms was tasked with amplifying the voices of parents & children regarding research participation, while conducting community engagement activities for chapter members.

Milestones:

- Amplify the voices of Parents & Children regarding research participation; Increase community enrollment and/or researcher training initiatives by collaborating with NIH
- Increase the number of parents with children 7Yrs+ who are educated on the All of Us Research program by conducting community engagement activities

Mocha Moms, Inc. Accomplishments & Impact

In All of Us' preparation for the next phase of pediatric enrollment for ages 7-12, Mocha Moms, Inc. participated in the first-ever pediatric engagement discussion: Community Engagement Studio, hosted by Vanderbilt University and the All of Us Engagement Team. Mocha Moms played an important role by securing a total of **7 dyads** (one child and one adult) who discussed their opinions about clinical trials and incentives. The information gathered from the studios was used for the development of pediatric protocol phase 2, a very high priority for the program.

In conjunction with the DREF, Mocha Moms, Inc. hosted the first AoU Ambassador Training. With **60+** chapters across the country, in **44** states, it provided an opportunity to deliver information to Mochas and communities about the importance of participating in biomedical research for themselves and their children. **31** Mocha leaders participated in the training session. The training was designed to inform leaders about:

- Planning and hosting health events and programming
- Educating their communities about the importance of participating in clinical research

Mocha Moms, Inc. hosted the following 2 impactful webinars focused on health topics that impact African American mothers and their families that emphasized the importance of participating in research programs, such as *All of Us*:

NICU Moms

- 243 Event Views
- Key takeaways included the importance of research participation in neonatal care; The critical roles of support systems and early intervention; The emotional impact of NICU experiences

Thriving, Not Just Surviving

- 450 Event Views
- Key takeaways included the importance of preventative measures, self-care, wellness programs, weight loss, and personal empowerment; The significance of nutrition, stress management; The role of hormone replenishment in managing menopausal symptoms



Sub-Awardees & Initiatives



In September of 2024, DREF was asked to assist the Macon County Healthcare Authority in guiding community partners in Macon County, Alabama and Tuskegee University researchers into developing a strategic Sustainability Plan that would develop and encourage research engagement efforts with the surrounding Tuskegee, Alabama community.

Milestones:

- Identify research priorities for Macon county by conducting a series of listening sessions with relevant partners
- Identify current researchers at Tuskegee
 University that are using All of Us data and
 increase the number of Tuskegee
 researchers utilizing the Researcher
 Workbench
- Expand the research capacity of community partners by conducting a series of workshops that support research engagement based on the priorities identified by the community partners
- Develop strategies and a multi-year need assessment and sustainability plan in Macon County that will guide future research engagement with All of Us

Macon County Collaborative Health Accomplishments & Impact

Activities conducted under the Macon County Community Health Collaborative consistently advanced the strategic goals outlined in the milestones, with a strong emphasis on community engagement, research development, and collaborative planning. These efforts have been guided by the Social Determinants of Health and Social Ecological Model, ensuring a holistic and equity-driven approach to improving health outcomes in Macon County.

A foundational component of this work was the series of 5 community listening sessions held throughout March and April of 2025. These sessions brought together a diverse group of stakeholders—including elected officials, educators, healthcare professionals, faith leaders, community organizations, and Tuskegee University students—to identify local priorities and shape the community's research agenda. Insights from these sessions directly informed the planning and execution of the Joint Research Meeting held in June of 2025. The listening sessions surfaced critical questions related to education access, economic development, healthcare delivery. neighborhood infrastructure, and social cohesion, which became the basis for collaborative research and program development.

Following the listening sessions, the Joint Research Meeting between Tuskegee University researchers and Macon County community partners produced actionable outcomes across multiple domains, including proposals for a K-12 tutoring initiative, maternal health equity programs, and strategies to improve local information dissemination. These outcomes were documented and integrated into the Macon County Sustainability Plan and supported through the submission of Action Plan Forms detailing goals, responsibilities, timelines, and evaluation metrics.


At the conclusion of the award year, plans were made to continue logistical planning for a leadership meeting with the Tuskegee University Provost and DREF leadership, as well as the **2nd Joint Research Meeting.** These meetings will serve as critical opportunities to refine research priorities, strengthen institutional partnerships, and expand collaborative programming across the county.
